SCHOOL BOARD MESSAGE

While students get a break from school during summer, a lot happens throughout our school district to prepare for another year of instruction. Our maintenance and custodial staffs do a thorough cleaning of the facilities and tackle projects that can't be completed while students are always around, and keep our schools running and looking great (lots of people comment on how good our buildings look while visiting them). Our secretarial staff handles the administrative details that need attention year-round, not just when school is in session. Our tech staff are updating computers, installing new equipment, and preparing new software programs for use by staff and students. The business office handles the daily matters that are necessary for reporting purposes, and to keep the operations moving smoothly. And this year, we have contractors at all the buildings starting the multi-year

renovation projects that are needed for maintaining our facilities.

Your school board is proud of our staff that support all our educational programs in Brentwood. They are some of the unseen and unsung heroes of our educational system and help make us better as a school district. They and our

teachers and administrators are working to constantly improve our programs and prepare our students for a rapidly changing workplace in the 21st century. We are beginning a new school year, so watch for opportunities to support our Brentwood students in their academic, athletic, extracurricular, and musical activities.



Are Charter and Cyber Schools Free?

You have seen the billboards and heard the commercials claiming that charter and cyber schools are tuition free. The truth is the tuition is not free and is paid for by the student's home district. Charter and cyber school tuition are NOT based on the actual cost to educate the student at the charter or cyber school and the tuition rates can vary drastically from district to district. The tuition is calculated on a per pupil cost to the home district. This means that School District A would be charged \$12,000/student and School District B would be charged \$48,000 per student to attend the same charter or cyber school. This is adding to the divide between wealthy and poor school districts. Recently there has been a push in the state for a formula to be enacted to determine the cost of educating a student at a charter or cyber school.

School districts must bear the burden of mandated increases in charter school tuition, employee pensions, and special education. School districts do not have the authority to lower these mandated costs and are forced to cut programs or increase taxes to balance the budget. More specifically, from 2010-2018 the cumulative cost of charter cyber school tuition,

employee pensions and special education rose by \$4.68 billion but the state only increased funding by \$2.24 billion. The remaining balance was forced on to taxpayers across the state. The legislators permitted the two systems (traditional and charter/cyber) for educating students in Pennsylvania. Instead of adequately funding both systems, Pennsylvania ranks at the in the bottom of all states for funding. The situation became so dire that a lawsuit was filed, and Pennsylvania's Commonwealth Court issued a trial schedule order beginning in October 2019.

Furthermore, charter and cyber schools are not managed by an elected board of school directors, so taxpayers have no say in who is managing their tax money. This taxpayer money leaves the local school district reducing the resources available for the students who continue in the traditional local school district.

The chart below illustrates the increases in tuition costs of charter and cyber schools and how much taxpayer money has left the district.



NMSI Grant Makes Impact in Second Year

The Brentwood Borough School District partnered with the National Math and Science Initiative (NMSI) during the 2017-2018 school year to increase the district's capacity of offering opportunities to students to increase achievement. During the 2018-2019 school year, Brentwood High School completed the second year of a three-year grant. The mission of NMSI is to significantly improve student opportunities and achievement by advancing STEM teaching and learning. NMSI strives to partner with school districts so that all students have the knowledge and skills to thrive in the global economy of the 21st Century. They accomplish these goals by empowering teachers, equipping students, and raising the academic bar



on achievement. Over the past two years, teachers from Elroy Elementary, Moore Elementary, Brentwood Middle School and Brentwood High School participated in a summer professional development titled "Laying the Foundations, which is a collaborative, hands-on training that equips teachers to implement classroom strategies to boost student achievement

in rigorous course work, including Advanced Placement. The Advanced Placement teachers at the high school attended the College Readiness Program, hands-on interactive training to better prepare them for teaching in their content area and preparing students with skills that would transfer to the specific Advanced Placement Exams. NMSI also provided mentors, teacher training, and student study session with other school districts to increase collaboration and support among area schools.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Brentwood High School offered 12 AP courses. We increased the number of students who were taking Advanced Placement classes, increased the number of students who took the Advanced Placement exams, and increased the number of qualifying scores that students earned on the Advanced Placement exams. In addition, we had students attempt other AP tests based on their interest and confidence in taking AP exams for potential college credit. The NMSI grant has enabled more of our students to be exposed to more rigorous and college-ready curriculum with more supports. We are entering the third year of the grant and we are looking forward to working with NMSI and expect to continue to make gains district wide to the benefit of our students.

Changes at Brentwood Middle/High School for the 2019-2020 school year

FACILITIES

- 1. Replacement and updating of the phone system and fire alarm system.
- 2. First phases of the replacement of the roof.
- 3. Renovations and repairs to the auditorium that were necessary due to water damage from last fall. Wallpaper was removed and the auditorium walls were refinished and painted.
- 4. Renovations to the current middle school gym which will now serve as the main gym for varsity sporting events. New bleachers will allow seating capacity to increase from 450 to 750. The former middle school gym (nearest Brentwood Park) will now be known as the "BLUE Gym" while the former high school gym (in the 1972 building) will be called the "GOLD Gvm".


CURRICULUM

- 1. 6th grade students will follow a 60-minute block schedule for their core classes.
- 2. Middle school students will be enrolled in Computer Science classes in grades 6 and 8. These courses will serve as a foundation for the Computer Science program that was established at the high school in 2018-2019.
- 3. The middle school Advisory program was restructured for the 2019-2020 school year. Each middle school student will be assigned the same teacher/advisor for all 3 years of middle school. The students and advisors were paired based on positive relationships and common interests.
- 4. A Python programming course through a partnership with Carnegie Mellon University will be offered at the high school.
- 5. A new Digital Media course will be offered at the high school. Digital Media is a combination of digital editing and broadcasting that the students will be exposed to in order to create their own news stories and produce school announcements.

As a parent, you are your child's first and most important teacher. When parents and families are involved in their children's schools, the children do better and have healthier feelings about going to school. In fact, many studies show that what the family does is more important to a child's school success than how much money the family makes or how much education the parents have. There are many ways that parents can support their children's learning at home and throughout the school year. Here are some ideas to get you started!

- 1. Meet your child's teacher. Elroy's Open House is September 12th from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. Let the teacher know you want to help your child learn. Make it clear that you want the teacher to contact you if any problems develop with your child. There will be interpreters at Open House this year. We will have a Nepali, Spanish, and an Arabic interpreter. If you feel uncomfortable speaking English, don't let a language barrier stop you. What you have to say is more important than the language you say it in!
- 2. Attend parent-teacher conferences and keep in touch with your child's teacher. We will have one parent-teacher conference day on November 8th. You can also ask to meet with your child's teacher any time during the year. If you have a concern and can't meet face-to-face, send the teacher a short note or set up a time to talk on the phone.
- **3. Find out how your child is doing.** Ask the teacher how well your child is doing in class. If your child is not keeping up, especially when it comes to reading, ask what you or the school can do to help. It's important to act early before

- your child gets too far behind. Also be sure to review your child's report card each time it comes out.
- 4. Make sure that your child gets homework done. Let your child know that you think education is important and that homework needs to be done each day. You can help your child with homework by setting aside a special place to study, establishing a regular time for homework, and removing distractions such as the television and social phone calls during homework time.
- 5. Volunteer at your child's school and/or join your school's parent-teacher group. Teachers appreciate it when parents help at the school! There are many ways you can contribute. You can volunteer in your child's class or in the school library. You can join our PTA, which usually meets the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the school library. The meetings give you a chance to talk with other parents and to work together to improve our school.
- 6. Monitor your child's television, video game, and Internet use. American children on average spend far more time watching TV, playing video games and using the Internet than they do completing homework or other school-related activities.
- 7. Encourage your child to read. Helping your child become a reader is the single most important thing that you can do to help the child to succeed in school-and in life. The importance of reading simply can't be overstated. Reading helps children in all school subjects. More important, it is the key to lifelong learning.

Technology in Physical Education


During this past year, Mr. Pavlecic, Elroy's Physical Education teacher, was awarded a grant from Phipps Conservatory to integrate technology into his Physical Education classes. Recent research has shown that students are doing more sedentary activities such as watching TV, playing video games, and using the Internet instead of being active every day. At Elroy Elementary, we encourage our students to be active for at least 60 minutes a day. The funds from this grant will help our students become more active by enabling us to purchase monitors, Wii Fit and Dance Dance Revolution.

Additionally, several studies have proven that physical activity helps to increase academic performance and attendance for school and improve behavior. Incorporating the Wii activity components into P.E. class compliments our STEM activities with an emphasis on Science, Technology and Math. Students will explore graphing their Fit Credits throughout the Fitness Unit. After completing physical activity stations, students will calculate their heart rate, compare the results to each station and chart their improved performance over time.

The different STEM exercise games will focus on the 3 parts of the health triangle, which include Physical, Social, and Mental. Bringing the new devises to the gymnasium will allow students to have fun while actively burning calories and relieving their stress or anxiety. This year, students at Elroy will experience exciting innovative activities with their peers through the integration of technology during their gym class.

MOORE ELEMENTARY

French Drains, a Six-day Rotation, and other Moore Changes!



While, for our students, the summer represents the time of year when they get to relax and spend time with their families and friends, the summer for schools is a busy time. In addition to our normal beautification and cleaning, this summer the Moore School began the process of having French drains installed around the building. The new drains will help to mitigate water damage to the building.

Starting this school year both elementary schools will be on a six-day special rotation. Each day will be lettered A through F corresponding to the day of the week in a rotation. Each homeroom will meet with one special a day. When there are closings or delays the day of the rotation that we leave on will pick back up on the next day when students return to school. Students will no longer miss specials because of holidays or snow days! The day of the rotation will be announced daily to students and it will be posted on the school's website. Families can learn more about their child's specific schedules and the six-day rotation during open house on Thursday, September 12, 2019.

Several curricular changes are also scheduled for the 2019 – 2020 school year. Fundations, the phonics program, will expand from kindergarten and first grade into second grade this year. Kindergarten students will have an additional special, technology, this year. The library and technology curricula are being refined and a co-teaching S-TEAM rotation is being developed so that students are given multiple opportunities to apply technology in the core content areas.

These are just a few of the exciting changes happening a Moore. In addition, the teachers will spend their professional development days either learning about developmentally appropriate mathematics instruction or collaborating with BirdBrain Technologies to learn how to incorporate computer coding into classes.

The summer has been spent planning and preparing for the new year. We can't wait to have all of our learners back so that we can provide them with some new and exciting learning experiences!

DISTRICT NEWS

Elementary School Counselor

This year the Brentwood Borough School District received a School Safety and Security grant through the PCCD. This grant enabled the district to purchase a social and emotional curriculum for instructional purposes in kindergarten through fifth grade. This curriculum's instruction is part of the responsibility of the school counselor. Moore and Elroy will share the school counselor who will split their time between the two buildings. In addition to providing instruction to homerooms on a weekly basis, the counselor will be available to meet with students for issues that are short term in nature such as death of a pet. For students whose issues require therapy that is more longterm in nature, the district has partnered with Mercy Behavioral to act as a satellite location for mental health services. The elementary counselor will be available during Open House. Skyward and Office 365 Login Changes


The 2019-20 school year will bring some changes to the way students log-in to Skyward Student Access, the district computers, and Microsoft Office 365. The new username and password information are as follows:

To login to Office 365 the login information is as follows:

If there are issues with logging into these accounts, please contact a teacher. These changes were made to streamline the district's portals in which students access daily. The system that the district will use for a Single Sign-On solution is called Clever. The students will login to a designated district website for Clever, and a list of apps that their teachers use for classes will appear on the dashboard. The students will then be able to click on each icon and be asked to login using credentials that the district has set-up for them. This will be for the first-time students' login to



the app only. Each time after, the students will be able to click on the app and already be logged in. With these changes made over the summer, it should create more ease of use for students and teachers to use district web portals.

Student Information Release Opt-Out

Federal Public Law 114-95, Section 8528 of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires school districts to release student names, addresses, and telephone numbers to military recruiters upon request. The law also requires school districts to notify students and parents of their right to "opt-out" of having this information released to military recruiters. If you would like to exercise your right to "opt-out," please submit this request in writing to your child's building principal as soon as possible.


Golden Ager Card Available
