Comprehensive Planning Process

he Greek philosopher, Heraclitus is credited with introducing the concept that the only constant in life is change and in the educational world, we are consistently deal with change. Over the next three years, we will focus on four key goals that are central to our mission: Mathematics, English Language Arts (ELA), School Culture/Climate, and Community Engagement. Multiple teams of educators, led by Coordinator of Curriculum, Instruction and Professional Development, Mrs. Stephanie DeLuca spent a year researching and piloting Mathematics and English Language programs to identify the resources that best address our students' needs. Students, parents, community members and business owners were invited to provide input and feedback throughout the process, as well. The plan was presented at a public-school board meeting and then placed on public display for 28 days.

MATHEMATICS AND ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

Shifting from the lens of parent participation and community engagement to an emphasis on partnership is our goal. In parallel with our commitment to mathematics, we are equally dedicated to advancing our students' ELA skills. We will strive to improve literacy rates and foster a love for reading and writing. To measure the effectiveness of the newly acquired resources, the District will continue to utilize the Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment to track student achievement and growth. Our professional staff will be expected to implement the new resources with fidelity. Students who score proficient or advanced will be expected to attain their growth goals and students who are not proficient will be expected to meet or exceed their growth goals.

SCHOOL CLIMATE AND CULTURE

When students feel valued, they connect with school in a sense of belonging. This in turn correlates to great student well-being and higher academic engagement. The District will continue to

utilize the School Climate Survey and the Pupil Attitudes to Self and School (PASS) Survey. A student ambassador program will continue at the middle school and students at the high school will continue to engage in belonging activities on half days.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



The District was fortunate to work with the Brookings Institute, Kidsburg, the Grable Foundation and others who set out to ask the guestion, What does community and parent engagement look like in schools? Our goal is to shift from a lens of parent participation and community engagement to an emphasis on partnership is our goal with community engagement. We will seek feedback from parents and

community members over the course of the next three years. The first event in which feedback was requested from parents occurred during Open House. Poster paper was hung on the walls of the schools with this guestion: "What is your primary goal for your child this school year.

The options included:

- To prepare my child for future education through rigorous content knowledge across all academic subjects
- To prepare my child with work and learning habits needed in the future
- To prepare my child to be a good citizen, community member and friend, and to prepare by helping my child gain self-knowledge find a sense of purpose and better understand their values.

All parents were asked to identify which statement best represented their belief in the purpose of school. It is interesting to note that parents within the same household do not always agree on the same beliefs.

As we embark on this Comprehensive Plan, we are confident that with your partnership, we can achieve great things. Together, we can provide our students with a world-class education and prepare them for a successful future.



BRENTWOOD HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT HELP DESK

Brentwood Borough School District recognized a gap in technology services. Many students needed help gaining access to their devices. Student tech helpers are gaining real-world skills, such as experience juggling multiple projects, timelines, providing customer service, not to mention troubleshooting hardware and software. All the work serves as preparation for the future beyond school while also supporting the educational community.

The Technology Department started a pilot program for students in grades 9-12 at the High School. Students were interviewed and given procedures and guidelines of what would be expected. With great success, the Student Help Desk was implemented into our daily schedules. Currently, five students are working with the IT Department during the day with simple troubleshooting of devices, administering loaner devices/chargers, and fixing or repairing of devices. If this sounds like something you or your child would enjoy, time slots for additional students to join the program will be offered in the Spring of 2024.

BRENTWOOD MIDDLE-HIGH SCHOOL PARTNERS WITH ADAGIO HEALTH

Brentwood Middle/High School partnered with Adagio Health to provide students with information regarding teen vaping. According to many experts, vaping has become a national epidemic among teenagers and is even being seen with students as young as elementary school. Each year, the Food and Drug



Administration (FDA) and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) conducts a "National Youth Tobacco Survey." According to the most recent results from the 2022 survey, 11.3% of middle and high school students reported using a tobacco product within the past 30 days. However, when it comes to e-cigarette use, the percentage of middle and high school students who have used in the past 30 days increases to 14.1%.

Two representatives from Adagio Health met with Brentwood Middle and High School students during two separate assembly programs to share the impact that vaping can have on developing bodies. The students were told that the assembly was not designed to 'scare' them, but rather to inform them of the consequences of vaping so they can make positive decisions for themselves. After discussing statistics related to teen vaping in Pennsylvania, it was noted that the numbers are even higher than average in Allegheny County.

During the assembly, several specific topics were explored including: the physical and psychological impact of nicotine

addiction, the impact of vaping on internal organs, myths regarding vaping versus tobacco cigarettes, and how advertising is used to market vapes to underage students. Toward the end of the assembly, the impact of vaping and smoking on the lungs was demonstrated as student volunteers engaged in physical activity while

breathing through a straw.

As part of their community outreach to prevent underage vaping, Adagio Health has partnered with TRU (Tobacco Resistance Unit) to promote leadership among students in discussing alcohol and tobacco related issues. TRU is a statewide program overseen by the Pennsylvania Alliance to Control Tobacco (PACT) and the American Lung Association. The TRU program supports the efforts of students between the ages of 12-18 to stay tobacco and nicotine free through education and teaches students how to live a healthy lifestyle. The Brentwood Middle School 'Teens That Care (TTC)' club will be partnering with Adagio Health for their annual Red Ribbon Week, and Brentwood students will have the opportunity to get connected with the TRU program and serve as leaders in their community.

Corporal Marc Ziegler, PA State Trooper and Brentwood Class of 2002 alumnus, gives back to Brentwood students on a regular basis year after year. During Marc's enrollment at Brentwood he participated in multiple sports and activities. He knows the positive impact that staying active in school and his community had on himself and others and he shares this message with others in a variety of ways years later. Upon graduation, Marc enlisted in the United States Army and then attended California University studying criminal justice. He became a State Trooper stationed in Uniontown in 2009, and always remembered his hometown of Brentwood. Each year, Cpl. Ziegler participates in Brentwood Middle School's Career Day to share his work experiences with students interested in a potential law enforcement career. He also visits the elementary schools in the district for Red Ribbon Week and Touch a Truck along with Brentwood's Director of Police and Security, Officer Jeremy Bogdanski. At the high school level, Cpl. Ziegler ran the Hill Impact Program at the Army National Guard Armory. This 14 week course, taught by Cpl. Ziegler and other State Troopers and guest speakers, was available to any high school student ages 15-18 across counties. The program concentrated on physical fitness, paramilitary disciplines, and law enforcement education. Three Brentwood students, Remington Peters, Elliott Cramer, and Anthony Capozzoli, joined Cpl. Ziegler and other troopers to participate in the following courses: C.I.A. case solving, K9 Training, Stress Relieving Techniques, Effective Communication Skills and reading body language among other mini-courses taught throughout the program. Students also took a field trip to the 911 Call Center. A graduation ceremony was held for all cadets at Cpl. Ziegler's alma mater, Brentwood High School. COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS



The Bhutanese Community Association of Pittsburgh (BCAP) is offering an after-school program to students again this year and Brentwood Middle/ High School library will be a new location for the program. BCAP surveyed their families in the Brentwood area to determine interest in this type of programming and seventeen students indicated they would like to attend. BCAP utilizes both paid and volunteer tutors to work with the students to complete their homework, projects, and other assignments from school. The group also works on social and emotional learning and STEAM-centered activities with the students. BCAP has also

extended an invitation to school district staff to come to visit the program and to get to know the services BCAP can provide to families. BCAP staff seek to remove obstacles and build bridges between the Bhutanese families and school district staff to ensure that parents have an active role in the education of their children. The after-school program operates Monday through Friday from 3:00-5:45 PM.

BRENTWOOD HIGH SCHOOL INTERACT CLUB

Interact clubs bring together young people ages 12-18 to develop leadership skills while discovering the power of Service Above Self. Here at Brentwood, we have had our own Interact Club for the past 6 years. Led by Mr. Chris Weaver, one of our High School Science teachers, students meet bi-monthly to work on a variety of projects.

The Interact Club allows students to connect with local community leaders and helps them to learn how to become a leader in their own schools and communities, discover new cultures and promote international understanding, and helps them to have fun and make friends from around their local community, district, and the world!

Interact clubs organize at least two projects every year, one that helps their school or community and one that promotes international understanding. Rotary club sponsors mentor and guide Interactors as they carry out projects and develop leadership skills.

Students can engage in activities such as World Interact Week, Interact Video Awards' Rotary Youth Day at the United Nations, and Global Youth Service Day.

This year, our Brentwood students have recycled 280 pounds of shoes to help raise money for the "Got Sneakers" initiative. This was more than any other school in Interact District 7305. We were awarded a "Trex" bench for coming in 1st place.

Current projects that our Brentwood students are working on are the Ukrainian Orphanage Project which collects gifts for orphans in war torn Ukraine. Completed projects from this school year include collecting winter jackets for North Hill Outreach and the Got Sneakers program.

with Santa, Elroy Science Olympiad, Hopeful Ways glasses collection, Earth Day invasive species project, Salvation Army Red Kettle collections, and Action for Animals

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING TAKES ON A NEW TWIST AT BRENTWOOD

Many families may wonder, "what happens on the professional learning days where our students suddenly stay home for teacher professional development?" Well, this year at Brentwood, we've really switched up what our teacher learning looks like!

Every school district has many professional development priorities it must manage throughout the course of a school year. This includes statewide mandates, district priorities, building level logistics, curriculum and instructional practices and classroom needs. This year at Brentwood, we've shifted our focus to allow for online asynchronous learning of some of the mandatory items, so that during in-person professional learning days we can focus on providing opportunities for teachers to engage with learning groups on topics that are important to their practice. Social studies teacher, Jennifer O'Shea mentions, "The teachers are extremely excited about the new Professional Development model for this year. The asynchronous option allows us to work at our own pace and not take away from the club meetings and athletic events that so many of us are involved in for our students."

Here at Brentwood, we truly believe for our school to be a culture of learning for our students, it must be a culture of learning for our teachers; this is what we're aiming to do this year with our professional learning goal around cultivating a community of learners. In our recent sessions, teacher learning groups have been working on everything from implementing new curriculum resources, investigating new science standards, to creating works of art with resident teaching artists to infuse new ideas into our courses.

BRENTWOOD EDUCATORS GROW WITH PROJECT ZERO PITTSBURGH



This fall, Brentwood High School has continued to grow our practices with Project Zero Pittsburgh. On October 9th, several teachers from the High School, as well as Principal, Dr. Olexa and Curriculum, Instruction, and Professional Development Coordinator, Stephanie DeLuca, attended the Project Zero (PZ) Pittsburgh Regional Conference, bringing together like-minded educators from the region at the Children's Museum. The keynote speakers included Daniel Wilson and Tina Blythe, both from Harvard Graduate School







of Education around creating learning opportunities in classrooms and other spaces.

Each educator attended sessions around implementing PZ practices into their classrooms, gaining new ideas which will benefit our Brentwood students as we work towards developing habits of deeper learning. Dr. Olexa and Mrs. DeLuca also presented a session highlighting how we have started infusing these practices at the school level, creating a culture of learning for teachers. This group will continue to explore PZ practices and ideas throughout the year, working together to implement them in classrooms with students along the way.

LUNCH WITH THE SPARTANS!

When Nick Caponi was named the head coach of the Brentwood Varsity Football Team he wanted to do more than just manage the team. One of his primary goals was to do more community outreach and interaction to promote the program as a whole. His primary idea was to have members of his football team working with elementary students both at Elroy and Moore Elementary School in a positive way. One of the ideas that Coach Caponi came up with was called "Lunch with The Spartans."

Each Friday, select members of the football team are sent to Elroy and Moore Elementary School on a rotational basis. The players spend time with 2nd and 3rd grade students in the cafeteria. The players meet and mingle with younger students and engage them in conversation as well as developing personal relationships and providing mentoring. The players then walk these students back to their homerooms at the conclusion of lunch. They return to the cafeteria and do the same positive interactions with 4th and 5th Grade students. When the lunch periods are concluded, the varsity football players who are assigned to the schools for that week go to Kindergarten and 1st grade classrooms and they read to the students. The project has been a success for both the football program and the students at both Elroy and Moore Elementary Schools. The positive interactions of high school students and elementary students has been a very beneficial experience. The high school students provide an example to elementary students regarding doing good schoolwork, being a responsible student, and including others as part of their social mission. The high school students also promote the importance of reading and being good role models for our youngest students.

Coach Caponi feels that being a member of the football team is more than just playing football. The Brentwood Spartans represent the school and the community. Players are also taught that not only are they members of a team, but they are members of a bigger community. Their actions and their time with younger students sets a good example and promotes good citizenship. Giving back to the community, especially with our younger students is one of the greatest gifts that can be given. Being a good friend, and the importance of reading are the corner stones of this outreach program.
